Homecoming Hope

There is a logjam for fifth place in the Ivy League, and two of the four teams — Dartmouth and Cornell — tied for that position square off at Memorial Field. The winner is guaranteed to be in a tie for fourth place at the end of the day.

Dartmouth is coming off a 42-21 defeat at one of the Ivy's co-leaders, Harvard, and suffered a significant loss when the league's leading rusher, sophomore **Nick Schwieger**, was sidelined early in the second quarter with a broken hand. Just the week before he had set the school single-game rushing record with 242 yards against Columbia, but now will miss the remainder of the season.

Even without its star back, Dartmouth was able to put points on the board against the Crimson as all three touchdowns came after Schwieger was forced from the game. Senior **Rob Mitchelson** subbed in and performed admirably, gaining 61 yards on 14 carries as he sped through numerous holes in the line. And the receiving tandem of junior **Tanner Scott** and sophomore **Michael Reilly** combined to catch 13 passes for 174 yards, including a diving 12-yard touchdown reception by Scott before the end of the half.

Special teams continued to bring excitement to the Big Green games, with a blocked punt that was scooped up by Reilly for a touchdown and a kickoff following that score that was recovered by junior **Robbie Krattiger**, his first of two fumble recoveries in the game.

Sophomore **Conner Kempe** has stepped in behind center and made the most of his opportunity, throwing for 622 yards in the three-and-a-half games since Jenny went down, completing 57-of-113 passes with six touchdowns. Most importantly, he guided the team to a victory over Columbia two weeks ago, ending a 17-game skid.

To beat the Big Red, Dartmouth will need a defensive effort more in line with its showing against Columbia than the six losses. The Lions were held to just 271 total yards and six points, the fewest for a Big Green opponent in four years. Junior linebacker **Pat Scoriah** and senior free safety **Pete Pidermann** lead the team with 43 and 40 tackles, respectively, while freshman linebacker **Garrett Wymore** has come on strong lately and had 12 stops at Harvard.

Cornell has lost its last five games since opening the year with consecutive victories. Last week the Big Red came up just short at Princeton in a 17-13 loss. The offense can be explosive at times as it showed against Fordham three weeks ago, racking up 552 yards. But mistakes have proven costly of late with 11 interceptions in the last four games, five in the Fordham game alone that led to a 39-27 defeat.

Scouting the Big Red

For the second straight year, Cornell got off to a good start only to struggle entering its game against Dartmouth. The Big Red are currently on a five-game losing streak since winning their first two games; last year they had won their first three before dropping the next four.

Cornell can be difficult to defend as it is not afraid to pull out some gimmick plays. While Ben Ganter takes a majority of the snaps under center, and has thrown for 828 yards while completing 82-of-159 passes (with eight picks), watch out for "wide receiver" Stephen Liuzza. A converted quarterback, he still plays the role from time to time and has an efficiency rating of 171.1 while completing 15-of-24 passes for 271 yards and an 81-yard touchdown. He also leads the team in rushing with 269 yards and a 6.4-yard average. Randy Barbour leads the team with 79 rushes, but averages just 2.9 yards per carry.

While Liuzza only has four receptions, it's Bryan Walters the Big Green defense needs to worry about downfield. The deep threat is second in the Ivy League with 617 receiving yards, averaging over 17 yards per catch. Second to Walters in receptions is Shane Savage, who has been more of a possession receiver with 32 catches but just an 8.5-yard average.

Walters is also one of the top return threats in the Ivy League, having set career records in return yardage earlier this year. But Dartmouth has been very good at winning the battle of special teams this year, which in turn helps with field position.

Linebackers rule the Big Red defense; the four starters own the top four tackle totals on the team led by Chris Costello with more tackles than anyone else in the Ivy League (80) to go along with 11 tackles for a loss and three fumbles forced. Seven different defenders have at least one interception, led by free safety Ben Heller with three, which ties him for the conference lead.

The Big Red are not afraid to send their place kicker out for a field goal attempt as Brad Greenway has connected on 7-of-11 with a long of 47. Two of his four misses are from at least 48 yards away, but he has missed four of his last six attempts. Punter Drew Alston has been steady, averaging about 36 yards per punt without one getting blocked all year. Of course, the Big Green have blocked punts in each of the last two games ...

Jim Knowles coaches the Big Red and, now in his sixth season, has a 26-31 record. The 1987 graduate of Cornell spent nine seasons at his alma mater as an assistant coach after graduating, helping the team to Ivy League titles in 1988 and 1990. In 1997, he moved on to Western Michigan for six seasons, serving as the defensive coordinator his last two years there. After one successful season helping Ole Miss post 10 victories in 2003, he returned home to guide the Big Red. As a player, Knowles earned All-Ivy honors in his senior year as a defensive end.

Ivy Honor Roll

Although Dartmouth lost at Harvard, there were quite a few outstanding individual performances, as the Ivy League recognized four Big Green players on the weekly honor roll. Junior **Tanner Scott** got his second mention in three weeks for catching seven passes for 116 yards, including a 12-yard touchdown. Fellow receiver **Michael Reilly** was rewarded mostly for his special teams performance, rushing for 10 yards and a first down on a fake field goal, recovering a blocked punt and returning it for a touchdown, plus hauling in six passes for 58 yards. On the defensive side, senior **Pete Pidermann** and freshman **Garrett Wymore** tied for game-high honors with 12 tackles apiece, while Pidermann was the one who blocked the punt that Reilly returned.

Schedule Burden

Through the first seven games of the season, no team in the FCS had faced a more daunting schedule than the Big Green. Dartmouth's opponents have won nearly 70 percent of their games not including the victories over the Green. Three of the opponents are ranked among the top 20 in the FCS, and two others are undefeated in Ivy play. By the end of the season, the Green are projected to have the third most difficult schedule in the country.

Special Special Teams

If there is one aspect of the 2009 Big Green that has stood out, it is the special teams play. Dartmouth is among the top 20 nationally in punt return average, and sophomore **Shawn Abuhoff** is ninth in kickoff return average at 27 yards per return. In addition, the Green have blocked six kicks, including a punt at Harvard that sophomore **Michael Reilly** scooped up and brought home for a touchdown. Dartmouth is seventh nationally in blocked kicks.

Field Goal Famine

While special teams have been excellent, Dartmouth rarely has had a chance to call upon place kicker **Foley Schmidt** of late. After connecting on 9-of-13 field goals last year, the sophomore is just 3-of-4 without a single attempt in the last four games. This is only the third time in the last 35 years Dartmouth has not attempted a three-pointer over a

Harvard asserted itself early, first converting a 4th-and-1 and scoring on its first possession, then building a 20-0 lead at the intermission. Meanwhile, Dartmouth could only muster five first downs until its final possession, during which it equaled that total and scored its lone seven points on a three-yard pass from Conner Kempe to Will Deevey — the first- and second-string quarterbacks for today's game. The Crimson entered the game with a respected passing game, but turned the tables on the Green by rushing for 368 yards.

HEAD COACH



Buddy Teevens '79 is in his second stint at the helm of his alma mater, with his first tenure coming in 1987-91. In both 1990 and 1991, he led the Big Green to 7-2-1 marks, earning a share of the Ivy League title in '90 at 6-1, then winning the conference outright the following year at 6-0-1.

Teevens' record in nine-plus seasons at Dartmouth is 34-61-2 and 28-38-1 in the Ivy League.

A native of Pembroke, Mass., Teevens was a standout quarterback for the Big Green as he was named the Ivy League Player of the Year and honorable mention All-American while leading Dartmouth to the league title as a senior in 1978. He also lettered in hockey, helping the Big Green to a third-place finish at the 1979 NCAA championship.

Teevens began his coaching career right after graduating, working with the running backs at DePauw. In 1980, he became the offensive coordinator at Boston University, where he stayed until 1985 when he was appointed as the head coach at Maine. In his two years with the Black Bears, he posted the first consecutive winning seasons (6-5 in '85, 7-4 in '86) at Maine in 21 years.

After his first five years with Dartmouth, he served five years as Tulane's head coach, four of which came while the school was without a conference. He was instrumental in building the foundation that allowed the program to achieve perfection in 1998 with an 11-0 record.

Teevens spent two years as the offensive coordinator at Illinois before three bowl seasons with the Florida Gators in 1999-2001.

Prior to his return to Dartmouth, Teevens spent three years as the head coach at Stanford, helping to rebuild the program there.

four-game stretch — 1985 (4) and 1999 (5). The 1985 squad did end the drought by kicking four field goals in six attempts, against Cornell no less.

On the flip side, Dartmouth opponents have had a terrible time kicking field goals, converting just five in 13 attempts, or 38.5 percent. Over the last three games, the opposition has missed all four field goal tries, two inside of 30 yards and none longer than 37.

Schwieger Sidelined

One week after setting the Dartmouth single-season rushing record, **Nick Schwieger** suffered a broken finger on his right hand at the beginning of the second quarter at Harvard, cutting his season short. The sophomore was leading the Ivy League in rushing at nearly 90 yards per game at the time of his injury. But senior **Rob Mitchelson** stepped in and performed admirably, rushing for 61 yards on 14 carries.

Halloween Trickery

The Big Green brought out the tricks but failed to get the big treat at Halloween at Harvard. In the second quarter, Dartmouth tried a surprise inside kick, which they recovered, but the referees stepped in and flagged the Green for touching the ball too early. Head coach Buddy Teevens was not deterred from pulling out the stops, however, as a fake field goal went flawlessly as sophomore holder **Michael Reilly** took the snap and ran 10 yards for a first down; two plays later the Green were in the end zone. Finally, junior **Donald Kephart** pulled off an unusual kickoff as he booted a high, short kick that landed between the Crimson players and bounced back right into one. Junior **Robbie Krattiger** was able to corral the loose ball and carry it to the 28, making up for the lost outside kick earlier.

Great Scott!

Junior **Tanner Scott** joined the football team in the spring of his freshman year as a walk-on. As a sophomore, he was among the leading receivers on the jayvee team. Now he finds himself as the top target on the varsity, as evidenced by his seven receptions for 116 yards and a touchdown at Harvard. Two weeks earlier, he snared seven catches for 126 yards (the first 100-yard game for the Big Green this year) with his first career touchdown at Holy Cross. The last Dartmouth player with as many receiving yards was Philip Galligan '09 in the season opener at Colgate last year (146).

Putting Points on the Board

Dartmouth has played four Ivy League games thus far, and three of its opponents have allowed more points to the Big Green than any other conference team. The 24 points against Penn are actually more points than the Quaker's three other opponents have combined to score. No team has scored more than 21 points against Harvard, nor 28 against Columbia. To continue that trend, however, the Big Green will need to score at least 34 points against Cornell to match Brown's total.

VICTORY!

The 28-6 win over Columbia on Oct. 24 ended a school-record 17-game losing streak that dated back to 2007. The previous longest skid had been just 10

games spanning the 1998 and '99 seasons. The six points were the fewest for a Dartmouth opponent since a 17-6 win over the Lions four years ago.

Schwieger Sets a School Record ...

In the win over Columbia, sophomore **Nick Schwieger** broke an 18-year-old school record by rushing for 242 yards, just the sixth time a Dartmouth player had surpassed 200 yards on the ground. The previous mark of 229 was set by Al Rosier '91 in 1991. Schwieger also had a 66-yard touchdown run, the longest run by a Big Green player since Shon Page scooted for 79 yards back in 1990. And the last time Dartmouth had someone with a scoring run of at least that length was 1988 when David Clark '90 (97 yards).

... And Goes National

For his record-setting performance (and the second-most rushing yards gained in a game this year), **Nick Schwieger** earned three prestigious awards, the most notable being the National Offensive Player of the Week as selected by The Sports Network. He also was bestowed with the Gold Helmet Award, given weekly by the Gridiron Club of Greater Boston to the top FCS player in New England, and the Ivy League Offensive Player of the Week. The last Big Green player to earn the Ivy offensive award was Tom Bennewitz '08 in 2007 — the last time Dartmouth had won a game.

Fumble Recoveries are a Virtue

After five games, the Dartmouth defense had not recovered a single fumble, making the Big Green the only FCS team in the country without one. They say good things come to those who wait, and Dartmouth's first fumble recovery did not dispel that notion. Sophomore **Shawn Abuhoff** delivered a crushing hit to knock the ball loose, and junior **Charles Bay** scooped it up and took it 39 yards for a touchdown, practically clinching the victory in the fourth quarter against Columbia.

Penalties = Good?

Avoiding penalties is usually something a coach preaches to his team. But perhaps coaches should rethink that strategy. Dartmouth was penalized 114 yards in the 28-6 win over Columbia, its most penalty yards since amassing 137 against Yale in 2001. The Big Green just happened to win that game as well, 32-17. Over the last 35 seasons, Dartmouth has had more than 100 penalty yards just nine times — and has gone 7-2 in those games. If you lower the bar to 90 yards, the Green are 17-5-1. Conversely, when getting penalized for 15 or fewer yards in that time frame, Dartmouth has a woeful 6-28-1 mark.

Quick Shots from Columbia Win

- Senior **Niles Murphy** caught a touchdown pass for the fourth time in six games, this a 24-yard score to give Dartmouth the lead on the opening drive.
- The Big Green had 279 rushing yards as a team, their most since a 40-6 win over Yale in 1996 (281).
- Sophomore cornerback **J.B. Andreassi** broke up four pass attempts and picked off another, his first career interception.
- The 75 passing yards for Dartmouth were its fewest in a victory since equaling that total in a 12-9

victory over Princeton in 1997.

- Dartmouth had two touchdown passes and less than 100 yards passing for just the second time in the last 35 years, the other coming in a 45-7 win over Holy Cross in 1976.
- **Shawn Abuhoff** and **Luke Hussey** blocked a field goal and a punt, respectively, bringing the total number of blocked kicks to five this season.
- Dartmouth has won six of the last eight meetings with the Lions and is now 62-17-1 in the series.

Kempe Steps Up

Thrust into the starting role as the Big Green quarterback with the injury to senior **Alex Jenny**, **Conner Kempe** performed admirably against 24th-ranked Holy Cross on Oct. 17. The sophomore threw for 312 yards by completing 26-of-45 passes with two touchdowns and just one interception. On all but one possession, he guided Dartmouth into enemy territory, and inside the 35 on eight of the 10 drives. He is the first Green quarterback to throw for 300 yards since Jenny did so in the season opener last year at Colgate (343), and the 12th quarterback in school history to top 300 in a game. Those 312 yards are tied for the 17th most at Dartmouth.

Another Back-Up Makes His Mark

Kempe was not the only Big Green player replacing a fallen comrade at Holy Cross. Sophomore **Anthony Diblasi** started at strong safety in place of senior **Tony Pastoors** who was suffering from pneumonia. All Diblasi did was lead the team with nine tackles, seven solo, and pilfer a pass for his first career interception.

Quick Shots from Holy Cross Game

- Dartmouth had more first downs than Holy Cross (22-21), the second time the Green had done so against an opponent this year (Penn 19-16).
- Sophomore **Shawn Abuhoff** had his first career sack when he swatted the ball out of quarterback Dominic Randolph's hand in the fourth quarter.
- The Big Green pulled off a successful fake punt in the first quarter when punter **Matthew Kelly** completed an eight-yard pass to tight end **John Gallagher** on a 4th-and-4 from their own 39.
- Holy Cross leads the overall series for the first time at 35-34-4.

Jenny Goes Down

Early in the second quarter at Yale, senior quarterback **Alex Jenny** suffered a dislocated throwing elbow when he was hit just after throwing a pass. Jenny tried to brace his fall by extending his arms, but the weight of the defender falling on top of him put too much stress on the elbow to withstand. Just when he seemed to be on the verge of getting Dartmouth back to its winning tradition, Jenny will be out for the rest of the season.

Déjà Vu Doesn't Come Through

Before Columbia, the last time Dartmouth won a game it scored in each of the four quarters, rushed for 71 yards and, oddly enough, had a punt blocked and returned for a touchdown by the opponent. None of those things had happened since until the Big Green played Penn on Oct. 3, meaning a victory should have been in the cards. But it was not to be

as Dartmouth ended up on the wrong side of a 30-24 score versus Penn.

Long TD Run Long Time Coming

On the final play of the third quarter against Penn, sophomore tailback **Nick Schwieger** ran for a 19-yard touchdown, but not before breaking a couple of tackles in the backfield. It had been nearly two years since a Dartmouth player had run more than nine yards on a touchdown, and nearly three years since one scored on a run of at least 19 yards. Quarterback Tom Bennewitz '08 ran for a 10-yard touchdown against Holy Cross in 2007, one year after quarterback Mike Fritz '07 had a 30-yard TD run against the Crusaders in 2006. The last scoring run of at least 19 yards against an Ivy opponent? Chad Gaudet's 60-yard sprint against Harvard in 2004.

No Passing Zone

Although the Big Green fell to Penn on Oct. 3, 30-24, the Dartmouth defense acted like air traffic controllers treating the airspace above Memorial Field as a no-fly zone. The Quaker quarterbacks (and halfbacks) totaled just 69 passing yards in the game, the fewest for a Green opponent since Lafayette managed just 51 yards 11 years prior to the day in

1998. Princeton was the last Ivy opponent to throw for less than 69 yards (67) in the final game of the 1996 season.

Inching (or Yarding) Up Passing List

After throwing for 31 yards at Yale before getting injured, senior **Alex Jenny** now has 2,341 yards through the air, surpassing Bill Beagle '56 by one yard for 13th all-time at Dartmouth. Jenny began the season 19th on that list, but jumped four spots after the first game, passing Bill King '63, Mike Fritz '07, Tom Bennewitz '08 and ... current head coach Buddy Teevens '79. Actually, Jenny passed all four of them in one fell swoop on his 57-yard touchdown pass to sophomore **Michael Reilly**, the longest completion of his career and longest by a Dartmouth quarterback since three 60-plus yard passes by Bennewitz against Cornell on Nov. 3, 2007.

Penn Game Picked up by VERSUS

The game against Penn was televised nationally by the VERSUS network.

- The broadcast of the game extends Dartmouth's streak of seasons with at least one game on television to 16.
- Last year a school-record six of the 10 football games were broadcast on television.
- The Green now have lost 11 of their last 12 televised games.
- Overall, Dartmouth is now 24-44-1 in 69 TV appearances and 14-23 at Memorial Field.
- Dartmouth and Penn have met seven times on TV, and the Quakers have won each game.

Schweet Schwieger

By amassing 119 yards on the ground against New Hampshire, sophomore **Nick Schwieger**

became the first Big Green runner to rush for 100 yards since Nate Servis '09 and current senior **Rob Mitchelson** both did it against Columbia on Oct. 20, 2007, a span of 16 games. Schwieger was very consistent all game, not once losing a single yard on any of his 26 carries while posting a long of 12 yards. Dartmouth had not had 100 rushing yards *as a team* since the final game of the 2007 season.

Turnover Trouble

In what was a mismatch on paper between Dartmouth and sixth-ranked New Hampshire turned into quite an interesting ball game despite the final score of 44-14. The Big Green had a terrific opportunity to take a one-point lead in the middle of the third quarter, but fumbled the ball away at the UNH 12. Dartmouth committed five turnovers in the game, its most since coughing the ball up five times against Cornell in 2007 — a game the Green won, 59-31.

UNH Series Goes on Hiatus

Dartmouth and New Hampshire have played every year this millennium, but after 10 straight years of Wildcat wins, the final two years of the contract have been suspended for four years. Sacred Heart will replace UNH on the schedule the next two years. With New Hampshire's 44-14 win on Sept. 26, the Wildcats now own an 18-17-2 lead in the all-time series. Dartmouth won the first 16 games, and UNH is 17-0-2 in the last 19. The last Big Green win in the series came in 1976 by a 24-13 final.

Mann '02 Returns to Dartmouth

Former Big Green quarterback Brian Mann '02 has been hired by head coach Buddy Teevens as the director of football operations. Mann will oversee all administrative functions of the football office and work closely with football alumni and others to coordinate activities of the Friends of Dartmouth Football. While a player, Mann set the Big Green single-season passing record with 2,913 yards in 2002, and is second in career yardage with 5,912, behind only former NFL quarterback Jay Fiedler '94.

Tackling Practice

No fewer than five Big Green defenders posted at least 10 tackles against Colgate, led by senior strong safety **Tony Pastoors** with a career-high 16, nearly matching his career *total* of 21 entering the game. The other four also set career highs in stops: sophomore **Royce Egeolu** with 13, sophomore **Diego Fernandez-Soto** with 12, junior **Charles Bay** with 11 and sophomore **J.B. Andreassi** with 10.

Defensive Extra Point

Rarely will a Big Green fan witness a defensive extra point in a Dartmouth football game, for either team. No Big Green opponent has ever returned an extra point attempted by Dartmouth for a two-point conversion at the other end of the field. And sophomore **Shawn Abuhoff** became just the second Big Green player to accomplish the feat with his 90-plus yard return of a blocked extra point, courtesy of sophomore **Eddie Smith**. The only other one in Dartmouth history was pulled off by Joe Perry '94 against Cornell in 1993.

Both junior defensive end **Charles Bay** and sophomore defensive tackle **Mark Dwyer** each registered their first career sack in the loss to Colgate on Sept. 19. Bay's came on the first possession of the game as he poked the ball out of the quarterback's hand causing a fumble. Last year the Big Green had just two games in which the defense recorded more than one sack, one of which came at Colgate as well.

Getting a Lead

Last year, Dartmouth held the lead for a grand total of 22 minutes and 26 seconds in the 10 games combined. Nearly two-thirds of that time with the lead (14:55) came in the opener against Colgate. And until the Green took a 15-13 advantage against the Raiders this year, they had not had a lead in nearly 380 minutes, or more than six full games. But thanks to leading nearly wire-to-wire against Columbia, Dartmouth has led for 58:12 this season.

McManus Record Chase on Hold

Last year, wide receiver **Tim McManus** became just the fifth Big Green receiver to snare 60 passes in a season while amassing 637 yards. That latter figure put him over 1,000 for his career in just two seasons at Dartmouth. His chase to become the fifth Big Green receiver with 2,000 yards in a career is currently on hold as he recovers from a fractured leg suffered just before preseason camp started.

Changing of the Guard

There will be quite a few new faces on the field this year for the Big Green, particularly in the skilled offensive positions. More than 77 percent of the rushing yards graduated — mostly in the form of Milan Williams — and more than half of the receiving yards from last year will not be on the field this year. The defensive side is not much different in terms of returning numbers as 55 percent of the tackles, including five of the top seven tacklers on the team, have moved on. At least at quarterback Dartmouth has good experience in senior **Alex Jenny** and sophomore **Conner Kempe** who combined to throw all but six of the team's yards last year.

Co-Captains

This season Dartmouth has two captains in senior free safety **Peter Pidermann** and junior wide receiver **Tim McManus**.

Harvard Scrimmage

Although Dartmouth was beaten by the top-25 ranked Harvard Crimson in a preseason scrimmage, 44-17, Coach Teevens came away with some things to build upon, particularly a 100-yard rushing half by sophomore **Nick Schwieger**. Three receivers had at least 50 receiving yards, led by sophomore tight end **John Gallagher**, and quarterback **Alex Jenny** was just shy of 200 yards passing without an interception. On the other side of the ball, senior safety **Tony Pastoors** and sophomore linebacker **Royce Egeolu** led Dartmouth with seven tackles apiece, while Pastoors and freshman **Garrett Waggoner** each forced a fumble.

DARTMOUTH SUCCUMBS TO COLGATE IN SEASON OPENER, 34-15

HANOVER, N.H. — Tailback Jordan McCord carried the ball 44 times for 212 yards and two touchdowns as visiting Colgate defeated Dartmouth on Saturday afternoon, 34-15, in the season opener for the host Big Green at Memorial Field. The Raiders improved to 3-0 on the season by winning their 11th straight regular-season game, while Dartmouth dropped to 0-1 despite converting a rare defensive extra point.

Colgate's offense held on to the ball for nearly three-quarters of the game (44:30) thanks to 63 rushes for 292 yards. Quarterback Greg Sullivan, besides rushing for 51 yards and a pair of touchdowns on 10 carries, completed 12-of-19 passes for 172 yards and a touchdown. Preseason All-America receiver Pat Simonds was held to just three catches for 64 yards and a score. As a team, the Raiders racked up 464 yards on 82 plays.

The Dartmouth offense had just one drive of longer than six plays, that being of 11 plays coming late in the second quarter which led to a field goal. Of the Big Green's 11 possessions, seven ended in under one minute. The running game was held in check with just 26 rushing yards, with sophomore Nick Schwieger carrying the ball 14 of the 16 attempts for 38 yards.

Senior quarterback Alex Jenny, who had 343 yards passing against Colgate a year ago, was held to less than half that total at 147 yards on 11-of-28 passing with one touchdown, a 57-yard bomb to sophomore Michael Reilly in the first quarter. Reilly led all receivers with four catches and 87 yards, including his first career score.

"We had our opportunities to make some plays today," stated Dartmouth head coach Buddy Teevens, "but we missed too many assignments and that really cost us. We competed very well, but we cannot afford the mental mistakes if we want to beat a football team as good as Colgate."

Colgate got on the board first on a 12-yard touchdown pass from Sullivan to Simonds, capping a nine-play, 60-yard drive with 3:45 on the clock in the first quarter.

Jenny wasted no time in tying the score at seven on the first play from scrimmage after the ensuing kickoff with his strike to Reilly.

In the second quarter, Colgate methodically

marched 79 yards in 13 plays, culminating on a Sullivan 15-yard keeper. The extra point, however, was blocked by sophomore defensive tackle Eddie Smith. The ball was scooped up by sophomore Shawn Abuhoff, and he outran the Raiders to the opposite end of the field for a defensive two-point conversion, making the score 13-9 in favor of Colgate. It was just the second defensive extra point in Dartmouth history, the other coming against Cornell in 1993.

The Big Green tacked on three more points to close within one when their 63-yard drive stalled at the Raider four, leading to a 21-yard field goal by sophomore Foley Schmidt.

As time expired in the half, Colgate had an opportunity to get those three points back, but Evan Colborne's 30-yard field goal attempt went wide left to keep the score at 13-12.

Dartmouth took its only lead of the game at the outset of the second half. Abuhoff brought the kickoff back 42 yards to the Raider 28, and six plays later, Schmidt booted a 29-yard field goal for a 15-13 Big Green lead.

The lead was short-lived, however, as Colgate needed little more than four minutes to traverse the field. Sullivan pushed his way into the end zone from the one on 3rd-and-goal for the go-ahead touchdown, and Colborne added the extra point for a five-point advantage at 20-15.

After just one play from scrimmage, Dartmouth found itself in Raider territory, but safety Vinnie Nicosia got to Jenny on a blitz before he could throw the ball, forcing a fumble which was recovered by Lamont Sonds at the Raider 48. That led to another Colgate touchdown, this time on a seven-yard run by McCord, pushing the Raider lead to 12.

Abuhoff nearly made it a one-possession game early in the fourth quarter when he broke free on a punt return. But punter Evan Goldszak, the last man to beat, was able to get just enough of Abuhoff's foot to trip him up after a 39-yard return. The Colgate defense was able to keep Dartmouth in check and force a punt.

The Big Green gained just 10 yards over the last 19 minutes of the game, and McCord sealed the Colgate victory with a 12-yard burst into the end zone with 4:56 to play.

FIVE TURNOVERS SABOTAGE SOLID OFFENSIVE EFFORT AT #6 NEW HAMPSHIRE

DURHAM, N.H. — Big Green sophomore Nick Schwieger rushed for 119 yards as Dartmouth gained more than 300 yards of offense against the top-ranked defense in the FCS, but sixth-ranked New Hampshire (3-0) took advantage of five Big Green turnovers to defeat Dartmouth (0-2) at Cowell Stadium on Saturday afternoon, 44-14. The host Wildcats increased their unbeaten streak against the Big Green to 19 games, going 17-0-2 over the last 30 years and winning the last 12.

New Hampshire evenly distributed 528 yards of offense — 269 on the ground, 259 through the air — despite the loss of starting quarterback R.J. Toman late in the second quarter. While Toman was 9-of-13 passing for 154 yards while running for 58 more on six carries, Decker was just as effective going 9-of-14 for 76 yards and a touchdown, plus 56 yards rushing on three carries, one of which was a 33-yard touchdown scamper in the fourth quarter. Running back Chad Kackert, making his first appearance of the season, led the team with 12 rushes for 71 yards and two scores.

With his 119 yards on 26 carries, Schwieger became the first Dartmouth back to rush for 100 yards since both Nate Servis and senior Rob Mitchelson both topped the century mark against Columbia on Oct. 20, 2007, a span of 16 games.

Senior Alex Jenny was effective at quarterback, completing 20-of-29 passes for 166 yards and a pair of touchdowns. It was Jenny's fourth career game with at least 20 completions. His favorite receiver was junior Tanner Scott, who caught six passes for 48 yards, while sophomore Michael Reilly hauled in four receptions for a game-high 57 yards.

The New Hampshire offense proved to be difficult to stop in the opening quarter, scoring three touchdowns. After taking the opening kick, the Wildcats took nine plays to move the ball 70 yards to the end zone. Toman completed all three passes for 39 yards during the drive, and Kackert scored on a four-yard run.

Dartmouth answered right back as sophomore Shawn Abuhoff returned the ensuing kick 58 yards to the Wildcat 27. Three Schwieger runs got the ball down to the 10 before Jenny lofted a pass to Reilly, who won the jump ball in the end zone to tie the score at seven.

But the Wildcats quickly marched downfield once again. Kackert finished off a seven-play, 62-yard possession with a 15-yard jaunt around the left side for a touchdown.

The Big Green moved the ball well again, but the Wildcat defense stood Schwieger up at the UNH 14 and stripped the ball for a fumble. A 65-yard pass from Toman to Eric Mangieri was the big play for

New Hampshire, setting up a seven-yard touchdown run on a Toman keeper. The extra point attempt, however, was blocked by junior Matt Oh to keep the score at 20-7.

Despite facing the top defense in the country in terms of total yards, Dartmouth continued to move the ball downfield. Jenny completed all six of his passes during a drive early in the second quarter, the final one for 12 yards to senior Niles Murphy for his first career touchdown. Murphy made the catch despite being interfered with, tipping the ball when it arrived before corralling it for the score.

The Big Green had one more shot to put points on the board before the half expired, advancing to the UNH 36 with under a minute to play. But Jenny took a shot at the end zone and had his pass picked off by Dino Vasso, keeping the Dartmouth deficit at six at 20-14 going into the intermission.

New Hampshire kicked off to start the second half, recovering a fumble at the Dartmouth 22 for a golden opportunity of its own. But a staunch defensive effort by the Green kept the Wildcats from advancing and the 40-yard field goal attempt went wide left.

Jenny continued to guide the offense through the Wildcat defense, only to have New Hampshire strip the ball out of receiver Garrett Babb's hands at the UNH 12. The Wildcats were able to convert that turnover into a touchdown on the 13th play of the drive as Decker connected with J.T. Wright from 15 yards out on a 3rd-and-goal. New Hampshire converted the two-point play on a shovel pass to Sean Jellison, making it a 28-14 game.

Once again, Dartmouth took the ball into the red zone, this time stalling at the 13-yard line. The 30-yard field goal attempt by sophomore Foley Schmidt went wide right, however, and the Big Green never threatened again.

After Decker's 33-yard touchdown run, sophomore Connor Phillips blocked another PAT for the Big Green. Dartmouth went three-and-out, but Abuhoff came up with his second interception in as many weeks at the Dartmouth 27. Two plays later, Vasso returned the favor with his second pick of the day, taking it 34 yards to the house for a 41-14 UNH lead. A Tom Manning field goal with just over a minute to play completed New Hampshire's scoring in the game.

For the second straight week, senior safety Tony Pastoors led the Dartmouth defense in tackles, accumulating 12 stops this week. Juniors Pat Scorch and Matt Oh each had a pair of tackles for a loss, while sophomore J.B. Andreassi registered his first career sack.

BLOCKED PUNT PROVES TO BE DECIDING FACTOR IN 30-24 LOSS TO PENN

HANOVER, N.H. — Despite touchdown passes to senior Niles Murphy and sophomore Garrett Babb, and a brilliant 19-yard touchdown run by sophomore Nick Schwieger, the Dartmouth Big Green were unable to top Penn on the gridiron on Saturday afternoon at Memorial Field in a 30-24 defeat. The Quakers (1-2, 1-0 Ivy) racked up 288 yards on the ground, 120 by freshman Lyle Marsh, in holding off host Dartmouth (0-3, 0-1 Ivy), which lost its 15th consecutive game.

Penn had much more success on the ground than in the air with starting quarterback Keiffer Garton sidelined by injury. The Quakers had just 69 yards passing — 21 on a halfback pass by Brad Blackmon — but the running of Marsh, who gained his 120 yards on 23 carries, freshman quarterback Billy Ragone (nine carries, 62 yards), Blackmon (4-70 yards) and Mike DiMaggio (8-35) allowed Penn to control the game.

While the Quakers were averaging 6.3 yards per rush, Dartmouth found the holes a little tighter, averaging 3.0 yards per carry and totaling 71 yards on the ground for the game. Schwieger provided all those yards and then some with 78 on 22 rushes. The Big Green managed to throw the ball well as senior Alex Jenny amassed 204 yards through the air, completing 23-of-38 passes with a couple of touchdowns. He also had a controversial interception late in the fourth quarter that mostly sealed Dartmouth's fate.

Trailing 27-17 with 7:15 to play, Dartmouth got possession of the ball at its own 29. Jenny completed a first-down pass to freshman tight end Justin Foley, but after a holding call, the Big Green were facing a 2nd-and-20 from their own 31. The next play was a pass beyond midfield which cornerback Jonathan Moore closed on and intercepted, despite Dartmouth coach Buddy Teevens' objection that the Big Green receiver was hit before the ball arrived.

Now with 5:24 left on the clock, Penn took to the ground to milk some time. The Quakers did take a chance on a 3rd-and-6 play by pulling the halfback pass out of the bag, but Blackmon was able to connect with David Wurst for 21 yards just before senior safety Tony Pastoors arrived. Six plays later, Andrew Samson kicked his third field goal of the day, a 29-yarder, to give Penn a 30-17 advantage with just over a minute left.

Dartmouth did not go quietly, however, as Penn booted the kickoff just 17 yards, which the Big Green quickly downed at the Penn 47. Jenny took advantage of the short field, completing 7-of-8 passes, culminating with an eight-yard score to Babb on a 4th-and-1 play. Down just six points with five seconds remaining, Dartmouth's onside kick was recovered by the Quakers, who knelt down to expire the clock.

The game began ominously for the Big Green when they were forced to punt after a three-and-out possession. The snap went over punter Matthew Kelly's outstretched arms, and when he recovered, his attempt to boot the ball downfield was blocked by Jim McGoldrick. The ball bounded into the end zone, where McGoldrick was able to pounce on it for a Quaker touchdown and an early 7-0 lead.

Dartmouth did not dwell on the mistake, driving down to the Penn three on its next possession with the big play coming on a 32-yard strike to Murphy. But the Quakers were able to keep the Big Green out of the end zone, and Dartmouth settled for a 20-yard field goal by sophomore Foley Schmidt.

Late in the first quarter, Penn needed just seven plays to move 54 yards — all coming on six rushes — to take a 14-3 lead. Ragone scored the touchdown on a three-yard keeper, while Marsh gobbled up 39 of the yards on three runs.

The Big Green put together their longest drive of the season to date — 13 plays and 74 yards — in the second quarter, with a little help on a pair of personal foul penalties against Penn. Jenny also threw first-down passes on a 4th-and-2 and a 3rd-and-10 deep in Penn territory before lofting a 12-yard toss in the corner of the end zone to Murphy. The Quakers had good coverage on the play, but Murphy was able to bat the ball in the air and catch it while on his back.

While Dartmouth's drive lasted more than six minutes, Penn nearly matched that when it got the ball back, hanging on to the ball for 5:47. But the Quakers traversed just 38 yards and settled for a 39-yard field goal, giving them a 17-10 lead at the intermission.

Penn began the second half like it ended the first with a Samson field goal, this time from 35 yards to take a 10-point advantage. After the Big Green went three-and-out, the Quakers drove into Dartmouth territory again, only to have Samson miss on a 44-yard field goal try.

The Big Green got good field position late in the third quarter at the Penn 49. Facing a 4th-and-1, Jenny completed a seven-yard pass to Tanner Scott for the first down, then connected with Will Deevy on a 14-yard strike. A handoff to Schwieger turned into a highlight-reel run, breaking several tackles on a 19-yard touchdown jaunt as the third quarter expired, and Dartmouth trailed by just three.

A quick response came when Blackmon broke a 55-yard run down the right sideline down to the Big Green one. Fullback Luke DeLuca then took a handoff and burrowed his way for the touchdown, and Samson's kick put Penn back up 10 at 27-17.

Juniors Pat Scoriah and Charles Bay led the Dartmouth defense with 10 tackles apiece. For Penn, Moore topped the squad with eight tackles and his interception, while Brian Levine had three tackles for a loss, including a sack.

BIG GREEN SUFFER 38-7 LOSS AT YALE AND LOSS OF JENNY AT QUARTERBACK

NEW HAVEN, Conn. — The Dartmouth offense managed only 127 yards and was limited by the loss of senior quarterback Alex Jenny to a dislocated elbow as host Yale defeated the Big Green on Saturday afternoon at the Yale Bowl by a final of 38-7. The Bulldogs improve to 2-2 on the season and 1-1 in the Ivy League by defeating Dartmouth for the seventh straight time, while the Big Green dropped their 16th straight game in falling to 0-4 overall and 0-2 in the conference.

Yale quarterback Brook Hart, making his first start of the year, completed 28-of-40 passes for a career-high 390 yards and three touchdowns while six Bulldogs combined to run for 130 yards for a total of 520 in the game. John Sheffield was the leading receiver for Yale, hauling in eight passes for 105 yards while Jordan Forney had two of the three touchdown receptions.

Jenny suffered his elbow injury early in the second quarter and was 3-of-6 for 31 yards to that point. He was replaced by sophomore Conner Kempe, who went 6-for-12 for 37 yards with one touchdown and an interception. Sophomore tight end John Gallagher was the lone Big Green receiver with more than one catch, nabbing four for 49 yards including the lone score. The Dartmouth running game was limited to 59 yards, 48 from sophomore Nick Schwieger on 18 carries.

After a scoreless first quarter, Yale dented the scoreboard first on a one-yard run by Jordan Farrell, finishing off a 12-play, 86-yard drive. Tom Mante's extra point gave the Bulldogs a 7-0 lead with 11:59 remaining in the first half.

On Dartmouth's next possession, Jenny ran out to his right on a third-down play to get more time to pass. As soon as he got rid of the ball, blitzing cornerback Adam Money arrived and his hit drove Jenny to the ground, causing the injury.

The Big Green defense came up with a fourth-down stop near midfield during Yale's next drive,

but on Dartmouth's ensuing second play, Kempe's first pass of the day was picked off by Drew Baldwin on a one-handed grab at the Yale 13. Four plays later, Hart connected with tight end Caleb Smith on a 73-yard touchdown pass.

Looking to build on its 14-point lead, Yale pulled a surprise onside kick, and Peter Balsam recovered the ball for the Bulldogs. Yale made it count eight plays later when Hart threw a 24-yard scoring strike to Forney for a 21-0 lead just before the half.

The Dartmouth offense, held to just two first downs and 53 yards in the first half, started the third quarter by traversing 60 yards to reach the end zone. A pair of Yale penalties proved costly to the Bulldogs, especially when an 80-yard interception return was negated by defensive holding. Kempe finished off the drive by finding a wide open Gallagher on the left side of the field for a 17-yard score. Sophomore Foley Schmidt provided the extra point to get the Big Green within two touchdowns, 21-7.

Yale had an answer for the Dartmouth touchdown with one of its own, needing just seven plays to travel 80 yards. Hart and Forney hooked up again for the six-pointer, this time on a short four-yard pass.

Just before the end of the third quarter, the Bulldogs ran a little more trickery with a fake punt near midfield. Punter Tom Mante ran for 17 yards on the 4th-and-2 play, keeping the drive alive. The Green defenders did not hang their heads, however, stopping Yale at the 17 before the Bulldogs settled for a 34-yard, line-drive field goal by Mante early in the fourth quarter.

Yale got one last touchdown in the fourth quarter on a five-yard run by Alex Thomas.

Dartmouth senior free safety Pete Pidemann led the defensive unit with 11 tackles while junior Charles Bay had the Big Green's lone sack of the afternoon.

KEMPE'S 312 PASSING YARDS NOT ENOUGH TO OVERCOME #24 HOLY CROSS

WORCESTER, Mass. — Holy Cross quarterback Dominic Randolph outdueled Dartmouth sophomore signal-caller Conner Kempe on Saturday afternoon, leading the 24th-ranked Crusaders to a 34-14 victory at Fitton Field. Kempe actually threw for more yards (312 to 264), but Randolph, a Walter Payton Award candidate, was more accurate completing 26-of-36 passes for his 264 yards — his 36th straight 200-yard game — with three touchdowns to please the homecoming crowd. Holy Cross improved to 5-1 on the season while the Big Green fell to 0-5 in losing their 17th straight game.

Kempe equaled Randolph's completions, connecting on 26-of-45 to post a career high in passing yardage with a pair of scoring strikes. Dartmouth finished the day with a season-best 384 total yards of offense, but wasted too many scoring opportunities inside the Holy Cross 30. Junior receiver Tanner Scott had a career day with seven catches for 126 yards, including his first career touchdown, while tight end John Gallagher also had a career-best seven receptions for 44 yards.

Randolph quickly maneuvered the Crusaders down the field on the first possession of the game, connecting on all five of his passes for 62 yards, the final completion being a 30-yard touchdown toss to Charles McCall. On the extra point attempt, however, the holder bobbled the snap and never had a chance to advance the ball, keeping the score at 6-0 just under four minutes into the contest.

Later in the period, the Crusaders were turned away in the red zone when Rob Dornfried missed a 29-yard field goal into the wind.

Dartmouth did successfully pull off a fake punt in the first quarter from their own 39, with punter Matthew Kelly completing an eight-yard pass to Gallagher for the first down. But when the Big Green went for it on a 4th-and-3 at the Crusader 36, Kempe's pass zipped past the outstretched hands of senior receiver Niles Murphy.

Holy Cross took advantage of the turnover on downs, traveling the 64 yards in 10 plays for its second touchdown of the day. Eddie Houghton carried the ball for the final five yards and the score, and Dornfried was able to kick the extra point through the uprights for a 13-0 lead early in the second quarter.

Both teams failed to move the ball much on their next possessions before Dartmouth drove

down the Crusader 15 late in the first half. But a holding penalty and a sack pushed the Big Green out of field goal range, leaving them staring at a 4th-and-27 which they could not convert.

Once again Holy Cross was able to convert a defensive stop into a touchdown, in spite of the fact it had just 1:24 on the clock and 68 yards to travel. A 42-yard pass from Randolph to Bill Edger took care of most of the distance, and Matt Bellomo plunged in from three yards out for the six points. Dornfried's extra point put the Crusaders up 20 at the half.

The second half began with Dartmouth receiving, and again the Green were able to move into Crusader space. A 17-yard screen pass to Schwieger gave Dartmouth a first down at the Holy Cross 24, but a holding penalty once again undermined the drive.

Holy Cross took over at the 20 after the punt went into the end zone, and marched the 80 yards in 10 plays. Randolph moved out of the pocket to get more time, and it paid off when he found a wide-open Luke Chmielinski in the back of the end zone for a 16-yard touchdown pass.

Kempe was able to move the chains yet again, but once inside the Crusader 30, yardage was difficult to come by. Dartmouth failed to get the yard on a 4th-and-1 at the 21, just short by inches. But the defense came up with the first turnover of the day when safety Anthony Diblasi recorded his first career interception.

Holy Cross returned the favor on the second play of the fourth quarter when Michael Wright picked off a Kempe pass at the Crusader 20 and returned it 53 yards. Randolph was able to turn the turnover into six points on a two-yard scoring strike to Nick Cole with 9:46 left in the game. Dornfried's extra point sailed through to put Holy Cross up 34-0.

Dartmouth finally was able to push through for a touchdown with 4:50 to play on a 16-yard pass from Kempe to the corner of the end zone where Scott jumped over the Crusader defender to pull in the pass. Sophomore Foley Schmidt provided the point after to make it a 34-7 game.

After the Crusaders went three-and-out, Kempe navigated the offense back into the red zone, then tossed a 16-yard touchdown to Murphy in the same corner of the end zone as the first scoring pass.

SCHWIEGER SETS SCHOOL RUSHING RECORD IN HELPING DARTMOUTH END 17-GAME SKID

HANOVER, N.H. — Sophomore Nick Schwieger ran for 242 yards to set a new Dartmouth single-game record to help end the Big Green's 17-game losing streak in a rain-soaked 28-6 homecoming victory over Columbia at Memorial Field on Saturday afternoon. Dartmouth (1-5, 1-2 Ivy) forced three turnovers and never trailed in the game, scoring on the game's first possession. Columbia dropped its third straight game to fall to 2-4 overall and 1-2 in the league.

Schwieger set the record by carrying the ball 29 times for an 8.3-yard average. At the end of the first quarter, he already had 69 yards as Dartmouth opened up a 14-0 lead in the opening period, and he surpassed 100 for the game on his second rush of the second quarter, a 35-yard jaunt.

"All the credit [for the record] goes to the offensive line," said Schwieger after the game. "They make it really easy for a back when they open up holes like they did today. It felt great to break some runs, something we need to do for the rest of the year."

The previous rushing record was 229 yards set by Al Rosier in 1991, the last year current Dartmouth head coach Buddy Teevens served as the Big Green's head coach during his first tenure at his alma mater.

"The guys played with confidence today," said a smiling Teevens in the postgame press conference. They came out hooping and hollering, which was orchestrated at first, but as the game went on became very genuine. The sense of relief for this team is huge, because there is no doubt that as the streak got to 15, 16, 17, it weighed on everyone. But seeing the school take such great pride in the team and victory by rushing the field was the best thing to see."

Dartmouth took control from the outset of the game, despite committing three penalties that cost the Big Green 25 yards on the opening drive. Schwieger carried the ball seven times for 45 yards, and sophomore quarterback Conner Kempe completed all four of his passes, including a 24-yard touchdown pass to senior Niles Murphy.

After the Dartmouth defense held Columbia to just one first down on its first drive, the Lions were forced to punt. But the snap went over punter Greg Guttas' head, and when he recovered, junior Luke Hussey was able to get a piece of the kick, which went just two yards past the line of scrimmage to the Lion 36. Seven plays later, Kempe found sophomore Michael Reilly in the corner of the end zone for a seven-yard touchdown and a 14-0 lead in the first quarter.

The rain continued to pour as neither team could dent the scoreboard during the second or

third quarters, although Columbia twice attempted field goals. The first came from 37 yards out, but went wide to the left. The second try came on the first drive of the second half, but sophomore Shawn Abuhoff was able to get a piece of the ball and send it careening off to the right.

The defensive unit really put the clamps down after that second field goal attempt. Late in the third quarter, senior free safety Pete Pidermann picked off a pass from Lion quarterback M.A. Olawale at the one-yard line, thwarting a Columbia drive. The next Lion possession ended in a similar fashion as sophomore cornerback J.B. Andreassi came up with his first career interception, this one at the Dartmouth 36-yard line.

The biggest defensive play came on the next Columbia possession, however, when Abuhoff leveled receiver Austin Knowlin right after a catch, jarring the ball loose. Junior defensive end Charles Bay scooped up the loose ball and rumbled 39 yards for the touchdown and a 21-0 lead with 10:35 to play.

An excessive celebration play forced Dartmouth to kick off from its own 15, and a personal foul penalty on the return put the Lions on the Big Green 34, leading to the lone Columbia score of the game. Olawale finished off the seven-play, 34-yard drive with a one-yard dive into the end zone. The extra-point attempt was fumbled, however, and the Lions failed to reach the end zone on the broken play, leaving the score at 21-6.

Looking to just run the clock, the Big Green placed a triumphant stamp on the game when Schwieger broke free on a 3rd-and-10 run around the left side, and he went 66 yards for the touchdown and the single-game rushing record. Now leading 28-6 with barely six minutes to play, Dartmouth finished off the win by holding Columbia to just one more first down.

"I didn't want to leave the field," said sophomore defensive tackle Eddie Smith. "I just wanted to celebrate with my friends, my family and especially my teammates. This feeling is addictive, and now we just want to keep on winning."

Dartmouth had 354 total yards for the game, 279 coming on the ground, its most rushing yards since going for 281 against Yale in 1996. Kempe finished the game 8-for-22 for 75 yards as the slick ball led to several drops. Pidermann led the defense with 10 tackles, while Smith and sophomore Mark Dwyer each had a sack of Olawale.

Olawale was just 12-for-32 for 89 yards and his two interceptions while rushing for a team-high 82 yards, just one more than running back Ray Rangel who had 81. Lion free safety Adam Mehrer led all players with 16 tackles in the game.

SPECIAL TEAMS SHINE, BUT DARTMOUTH DOUBLED UP AT HARVARD, 42-21

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. — Dartmouth junior Tanner Scott caught seven passes for 116 yards with a touchdown, but Harvard racked up 521 yards of offense and six touchdowns to maintain its perfect Ivy record by defeating the Big Green 42-21 on blustery Saturday afternoon at Harvard Stadium. Running backs Gino Gordon and Treavor Scales combined for 239 yards and five touchdowns to carry the Crimson (5-2, 4-0 Ivy) past Dartmouth (1-6, 1-3 Ivy).

Gordon needed just eight rushes (three going for touchdowns) to attain his 119 yards on the ground, while Scales carried the heavy load with 20 rushes for a game-high 120 yards and two scores. Crimson quarterback Collier Winters had an efficient day passing the ball, completing 12-of-15 passes for 204 yards and Harvard's final touchdown of the game.

Dartmouth lost the services of sophomore running back Nick Schwieger — last week's FCS Player of the Week — at the start of the second quarter due to a broken hand after he had managed just 18 rushing yards. Senior Rob Mitchelson filled in admirably, going for 61 yards on 14 carries. The majority of the Big Green's 262 yards of offense came through the air as sophomore Conner Kempe amassed 198 yards by completing 17-of-34 with a touchdown, but also two interceptions.

The first quarter was mostly a war of attrition in field position, and with Dartmouth going into the strong wind, the Crimson won that battle. Harvard missed on a 28-yard field goal try, but after a quick defensive stop, Scales took the first play of the next drive 40 yards for a touchdown and a 7-0 Crimson lead.

The next time Harvard got the ball, it was going into the wind in the second quarter. But the Crimson were able to gobble up yards on the ground, traversing 84 yards in just nine plays with six first downs. Gordon took a handoff 15 yards to finish off the drive with a touchdown and Patrick Long provided the PAT again.

Dartmouth started moving the ball effectively in response, getting down to the Crimson 39. But a Kempe pass was picked off by Ryan Barnes, who brought it back almost to the line of scrimmage at the 38. On the strength of a 27-yard pass to Gordon (and an interception by sophomore Shawn Abuhoff getting called off due to a roughing-the-passer penalty), Harvard was able to score its third touchdown of the day. This one was just a one-yard push by Scales on third-and-goal, giving Harvard a 21-point lead.

But the Big Green did not pass up the chance to advance the ball with just 1:33 remaining in the half. Kempe orchestrated an efficient six-play, 63-yard drive with three completions and a little help from a pass interference penalty. The touchdown came on a 12-yard zinger to a diving Scott just inside the right sideline.

Harvard got those points back to start the second half, traveling 93 yards in just seven plays, the last one a 48-yard scamper by Gordon.

The Big Green offense had its own quick response, starting its drive with a 43-yard pass to Scott to the Harvard 21. The drive appeared to stall out at the 15, but Dartmouth pulled off a fake field goal with sophomore Michael Reilly taking the snap 10 yards for a first down. Two plays later, Kempe scored from a foot out on a keeper, bringing the Green back with 14.

A surprise onside kick by junior Donald Kephart nearly worked to perfection. Although senior Chris Burns recovered the kick, Dartmouth was penalized for touching the ball just before it traveled the requisite 10 yards. That gave Harvard possession at the Big Green 39, and it took the Crimson six plays to reach paydirt with Gordon handling the honors on an eight-yard score.

Harvard got its only passing touchdown of the day on the next possession when Winters connected with fullback Kyle Juszczyk in the end zone from 31 yards out.

The two teams traded possessions, but on Harvard's punt, senior Pete Pidermann broke through the middle of the line and blocked the kick. Reilly scooped up the loose ball and ran it home for a 16-yard touchdown, making it a 42-21 game.

On the ensuing kick, Dartmouth kicked it short, and the wind held up the ball. It bounced off a Harvard player before junior Robbie Krattiger picked it up and returned it to the Harvard 28. But the Big Green could not capitalize, reaching the eight before turning it over on downs.

Krattiger recovered a fumble on the second Harvard play, however, and Dartmouth had another shot from the Crimson 28 for one last gasp. But Nick Hasselberg tracked down a Kempe pass that was batted back, making a diving interception with barely a minute to play and effectively ending the game.

Both Pidermann and freshman linebacker Garrett Wymore contributed a game-high 12 tackles for the Big Green defense.
